Existing Dumont staff will be available to have some input into the consulting services as follows:




Dr. Whyte has taught in the public school system in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, was a member of the Indian Studies Faculty at Brandon University and Director of the Indian Teacher Education Program at the University of Saskatchewan. He became the Executive Director of Dumont Institute in March of 1980.

Lyle Mueller, B.S.C., B.Ed.

Lyle Mueller has worked as a researcher for the Association of Metis and Non-Status Indians of Saskatchewan in their Aboriginal Rights Program and was in charge of a two-year consultation program to inform community people on Native Claims issues and to solicit their ideas and feedback, which led to the development of a Charter of Native Rights. Since April 1981 he has served as Executive Assistant to the Director of the Institute. He is currently doing studies on his M.E.d. in curriculum studies.

Keith Turnbull is a professional librarian who has worked as Assistant Librarian and Library Consultant for public libraries in Edmonton, in the Saskatchewan Regional Library system and for the Provincial Library. He has also assisted in or conducted a number of research studies on library needs and developed designs for small libraries, projected future library needs, evaluated library services and undertaken cost benefit analysis of




c) Community Training:

experience.


Ron Nablo, B.A., M.A.

What Will The Service Cost?

Consulting services will be provided at cost to the organizations using the service. These costs will be identified, negotiated and spelled out in a contract between the Institute and the organization using the service. At present, costs are approximately as follows:

• General consulting fees - \$200 per day

 Overhead & Administration costs — \$60-65 per day

Travel & Sustenance—at cost

 Materials, equipment and supplies, facilities, etc., for a specific project—at cost

The consulting services of specialists in areas such as Health services, Economic Development, Community Planning, etc., will be at the regular fees charged by persons retained for that purpose.
