

Dumont dit Cayole, Louis (b. 1853)

Louis was born on August 27, 1853 at St. François Xavier, the eldest son of Vital Dumont and Adelaide Gagnon. His grandparents were Jean-Baptiste Sha-ha-ta-ow Dumont (b. 1805) and Marguerite Laframboise (an Assiboine-Michif). Louis married Philomène Roussain in 1876 at Buffalo Lake. Philomène was the daughter of Paulette Roussain and Marie Anne McLeod. Her sister Caroline was married to Napoleon Ledoux of Muskeg Lake Band.

The Dumonts were a buffalo hunting family and lived at various locations: Swift Current, Maple Creek, Cypress Hills, Fort Assiniboine and Batoche. They had eight children, three of whom died as infants and Gabriel who died at age 12.

Children of Louis Dumont and Philomène Roussain:

- Gabriel, born May 12, 1877 at Swift Current, died 1899 at age 12.
- Rosalie, born November 1879 at Maple Creek, married Louis Thomas the son of Bernard Thomas and Eliza St. Denis in 1908 at Willow Bunch.
- Marie, born April 18, 1881 at Cypress Hills, died June 1881 at Fort Assiniboine.
- Pierre, born June 17, 1882 at Cypress Hills, married Rose Athalie McGillis, daughter of Modeste McGillis and Isabelle Poitras. He died sometime before 1905.
- Joseph Alfred, born February 18, 1885 at Batoche, died 1886 at Fort Assiniboine.
- Marie -deleine, born 1886, 20 or thirty miles north of Fort Assiniboine died at Fort Assiniboine the same year.

In the 1901 Willow Bunch Census, Louis Dumond (age 47), Philomène (age 45) Rosalie (age 22) and Pierre (age 18) are listed. In 1906 Louis, Philomène, Rosalie age 28 and Joseph age 12 are listed. In 1911 Louis, Philomène, Joseph age 18, and Helene age 5 are listed.

In a scrip application for one of his deceased children Louis gives the following history:

I was at Batoche during the rebellion. I left immediately after the arrest of Riel. I met Roger Goulet at Qu'Appelle and he told me I had better hurry out of the country. I took his advice. I was delayed at Buffalo Lake by my horse being sick for two weeks. I then went on to Montana passing the scouts in the night time. I missed the marks and was not aware when I got across the border. I thought I was in Canada when the child was born (Marie Adeleine) by the time it took me to get from the place of birth to Fort Assiniboine (Montana). It took me two days. I went slowly on account of my wife's condition. My place was a coulee the boundary crosses, also the birth was in the part of Canada.¹

Although Métis, Louis had taken treaty and was a member of One Arrow's Band. He was a member of Captain James Short's company, one of the 19 *dizaines* led by Gabriel Dumont during the 1885 Métis Resistance. His father Vital and brother François (One

Arrow Band # 58) were also active in the Resistance. Louis applied for Treaty annuity payments under the name of Louis Kayole in 1892. R. S. McKenzie, the Indian Agent for Duck Lake clarified his status by way of memo on April 2, 1892:²

Louis “Kayole” is a son of Vidal Dumond, is No. 56 of One Arrows band and was in the Rebellion at Batoche in 1885, after which he went across the line and remained there until the summer of 1889, when he crossed back to Swift Current and is still there working for the NWMtd Police and others ...I find in pay sheets that Vidal Dumond (his father) was paid for 1 Man, 1 woman, 2 boys & 5 girls and arrears for eight persons.³

On June 23, 1893 at Swift Current Louis applied for discharge from Treaty. He shows his occupation as “bone picker”. Note that in the application below he shows his mother’s name as “Daylight Giaugh.” He and Philomène subsequently made Métis Scrip applications on behalf of their deceased children.
