

Olive Patricia Dickason

Dr. Olive Dickason is a distinguished member of three communities: aboriginal, journalistic and academic. She has contributed greatly to Canadians' understanding of the aboriginal people. She is a graduate of Father Athol Murray's Notre Dame College, Wilcox, Saskatchewan.

After a 23 year career in journalism as an award-winning editor for the Winnipeg Free Press and the Globe and Mail, and several years as Chief Information Officer for the National Gallery, she studied history at the University of Ottawa. Following her PhD in 1977, she entered academia.

As one of Canada's outstanding historians and authors, with five books and hundreds of book reviews, scholarly articles and monographs to her credit, she is a pioneering scholar of Native Studies. Frustrated by the lack of an adequate survey textbook, she produced *Canada's First Nations*: A History of Founding Peoples, which won the Sir John A. Macdonald prize from the Canadian Historical Society and is now in its third printing. Her awards include the Dr. Joseph Crowshoe Award from The First Nations Student Association and the Native Centre of The University of Calgary. She is a Professor Emeritus of History at the University of Alberta. In 1987 Dickason was a delegate from the Women of the Métis Nation to the First Ministers' Conference and in 1992 she was named Métis Woman of the Year. Most recently she was named a member of the Order of Canada.
