Charlotte Sauv , b: November 12, 1808 in North Western Territory (near the Polar Sea, according to Paulette's research) d: October 14, 1888 in St Fran ois Xavier. she married Fran ois-"Xavier" Walsh dit Wells dit Welsh b: Abt. 1797 in Germany (or elsewhere, in Europe) d: Bef. 1867 in Red River District (Manitoba) m: Abt. 1834 in Red River Settlement (Manitoba)

<sup>4</sup> M tis MLA Edwin Bourke was born September 19, 1836, the son of John Palmer Bourke and his M tis wife, Nancy Campbell. Edwin married Isabella Hallett on March 26, 1862. Edwin was a buffalo hunter, farmer and politician. Later he inherited the Hay Field Farm in St. James from his father. This farm was purchased by his father when it was the Hudson Bay Company's Experimental Farm also called the Colony Farm.

Marguerite was born January 06, 1831 in Red River Settlement, she married James Sinclair b: 1826 in St Boniface Parish District, Red River Settlement about. 1849 in Red River District

<sup>7</sup> Joseph b.c. 1835, son of Amable Hogue and Marguerite Taylor, married Pelagie Turcotte the daughter of Vital Turcotte and Magdeleine Caplette.

<sup>8</sup> Amable b. c. 1830-35 son of Amable Hogue and Marguerite Taylor. He married Betsy Morrissette the daughter of François Morrissette.

<sup>9</sup> Born c. 1835-38, son of Benjamin Beauchemin and Marie Parenteau. He married Marguerite McMillan b. 1839, the daughter of William McMillan and Marguerite Dease.

<sup>10</sup> Thomas Hogue, born 1842, son of Amable Hogue and Marguerite Taylor. He married Philomene McMillan, b. 1845 daughter of William McMillan.

<sup>11</sup> Antoine, b. 1844, the son of Amable Hogue and Marguerite Taylor.

<sup>12</sup> Born c. 1846-48. He married Mary Allary b. 1851, the daughter of Joseph Allary.

<sup>13</sup> Andre b. c. 1840-41, son of Edward Guiboche and Marie Larocque. He married Julie Desjardin (b. 1846) daughter of Jean Baptiste Desjardin and Marguerite Hamlin.

<sup>14</sup> Noel, b.c. 1835-38, son of Edward Guiboche and Marie Larocque. He married Marie Smith b. 1832, daughter of Peter Smith and Susan Peysonette, then married Camille Desjardin.

<sup>15</sup> Michel, married Angele Guiboche b. 1831, the daughter of Edward Guiboche.

<sup>16</sup> Alexis, b. 1845, married Elise Bousquet, daughter of Michel Bousquet.

<sup>17</sup> Joseph, b.c. 1831-34, son of Joseph Leclaire and Therese Huppe. He married Louise Bousquet b. 1835, daughter of Michel Bousquet.

<sup>18</sup> Father Allard (1838-1917) was ordained in 1865, and followed Archbishop Tache into the North West. He joined the Oblates in St. Boniface in Manitoba, and studied Cree and Ojibwa. He was the first missionary in Fort Alexander in 1876, when he set up the Residential School and Chapel. In 1880 he founded the French Canadian Parish of St. Georges in Fort Alexander. In 1887 he was made Vicar-General of St. Boniface and took up residence in St. Mary's presbytery.

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<sup>19</sup> John, b. 1832, son of James Swain. He married Elise or Louise Laverdure, daughter of Joseph Laverdure and Nancy Duck.

<sup>20</sup> 1858, Hall (b. 1833) came to Red River Settlement and settled at Headingley on high ground along the Assiniboine River. He acquired a land grant in 1859, and by 1861 had erected a small dwelling named “The Hermitage.” His residence was later incorporated into a larger two-storey dwelling of log construction in 1878, and retained its name. It stood on the north side of present-day Roblin Boulevard, at Lot 1 of Headingley. Their house was open to many, and frequented by those recuperating from illness. During the 1869-1870 Red River Resistance, he took up arms against the Métis.

<sup>21</sup> Pallot was a member of the 1870 Red River Expedition. In the late 1800s he acquired lots 85-89 known as the St. Charles Prairie as his own private hunting preserve, he donated this land to the Department of National Defence in 1911 as a military training ground this then became the St. Charles Ranges. (west of the perimeter and north of Assiniboia Downs.)

<sup>22</sup> Lots 90 to 93 were formerly known as the Assiniboine Memorial Park Cemetery, this cemetery in west Winnipeg, complete with mausoleum and columbarium, was opened around August 1929 on Lots 90-93 in the Parish of St. Charles. As of late 1950, its name was changed to Chapel Lawn Memorial Gardens.

<sup>23</sup> Alexander “Sandy” Murray, M.L.A. (1839-1913)

Alexander was born in Kildonan on April 18, 1839, the son of James Murray (Scott) and Elizabeth Holmes (Métis). He was educated at St. John’s College under Bishop Anderson and won a scholarship in 1857. In 1861 he married Letitia Flett (also Métis), the daughter of the Reverend George Flett and Frances Fanny Cook. They had seven children.

Alexander was one of the founders of the Winnipeg Board of Trade, in 1873. He was elected to the Manitoba Legislature in 1874 and re-elected in 1878 for the constituency of St. Charles. He vacated his seat to serve as Police Magistrate in East Marquette, but remained in the position briefly. In 1879, he was elected to the legislature for Assiniboia, and re-elected in 1883 as a Liberal-Conservative. In April he was appointed Speaker of the House in which capacity he served until December 1886. He was appointed Minister of Municipal Affairs on July 7, 1887, and remained in office until April 30, 1888. He then accepted a post in the Municipal Commissioner’s office which he held for many years. He was twice a delegate to Ottawa as a promoter of “Better Terms.” He died at the family residence in St. Charles on May 12, 1913, and was buried in Headingley Cemetery.

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<sup>24</sup> William Tait was born in Headingley on December 6, 1826, the eldest son of William Tait (b. 1795, Orkney's) and Mary Auld (Métis, the daughter of HBC Governor William Auld ). He attended St. John's school. In 1851 he married Joanna Gunn, daughter of John and Anne Gunn. The couple had thirteen children. After the flood of 1857, he moved from St. John's to Headingley about 1860 and was engaged in farming until his death. He also operated a ferry service across the Assiniboine River from his property at Lot #14.
